Kaheem Ransom was a little-known high school basketball player out of Wichita Southeast before coach Bryan Zollinger extended a scholarship offer and brought him to Seward.

Since then, Ransom has been a part of two Jayhawk West championships, a Region 6 championship and a third place finish at the national tournament.

Ransom will move on to play at Sam Houston State, a Div. 1 program in the Southland Conference.

“I continued to get in the gym and work hard on my game,” Ransom said. “I took a few pointers from coach Z and coach Sautter of course, but I continued to work hard. I was blessed to score a lot of points. It feels good to be in this position.”

The size of Sam Houston State was a draw.

“I felt comfortable,” Ransom said. “It was a good fit for me at a mid major. I am looking for to go there and give my all.”

Seward added a key component for Ransom.

“Being tough, mentally tough and physically tough,” he said. “They harp on it every day. I wasn’t that tough in high school. I added that to my skill set and it worked out pretty good.”

Seward coach Bryan Zollinger said that Ransom brought the ability to work and play.

“He might be a little bit of a split personality,” Zollinger said. “When it is time for business he is good at that, too.”

But Zollinger was emotional about his prize recruit from Wichita.

“If there has ever been an example of why Winston Churchill said never give up, thats the guy,” he said.

Peters moves on to Sam Houston State

“When I first got recruited, I fell in love,” Peters said. “They came to a lot of games. They called me after games. When I went on the visit, players treated me like a brother. They told me they were all in to winning.”

Peters became a part of a team that gelled at Seward to win the Jayhawk West for the third consecutive season.

“With coach (Jason Sautter) and I, you don’t have a choice about defense,” Zollinger said. “It is what we do, our identity as a team. No one had put it to him the way we had, but we had a good scorer and he was willing to buy in on the defensive side. He actually held one team’s leading scorer to zero points in a game. That was incredible. We knew he could score. With Sam

Houston, they need scoring. They have 30 points coming in. That should give them a boost. To be a part of something big, you have to give up me for we, and these guys did that.”
