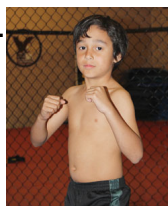

And they have learned to follow their dad's instructions to be successful.

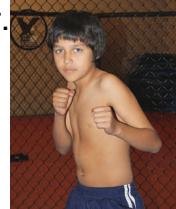
"The flying knee is my favorite move," Orlando said. "This is a fun sport."
