Routine blood test saved baby's life

MCADD a silent killer for many

A 14-month-old baby, who looked healthy and happy, died last week because of a rare genetic condition called medium-chain acyl-CoA dehydrogenase deficiency (MCADD). The condition is a type of fatty acid oxidation disorder that causes the body to be unable to break down certain fats into energy. It is a silent killer for many children.

Parents, Colleen and Morgan, found out about their son's condition when he was 14 months old. They had noticed that he was not gaining weight as quickly as other children his age. They took him to a pediatrician, who ordered a blood test. The results showed that he had MCADD.

Colleen and Morgan are now working with a dietitian to manage their son's condition. They are also looking for other families who may be affected by MCADD. They are currently raising money for research into the condition.
