**POWER GRAB IN THE SENATE**  
Senate Democrats rewrite rules, erasing 225 years of filibuster rights of the minority

The Senate Democrats on Friday passed a sweeping reform of the Senate's filibuster rules, erasing 225 years of the right of the minority to block legislation. The move would allow the majority to pass legislation with a simple majority of 51 votes, instead of the current 60-vote threshold. The change would also allow the majority to limit debate on legislation to a maximum of 30 hours. The move was controversial, with many arguing that it would undermine the Senate's role as a check and balance on the executive branch. The Senate is expected to vote on the reform later this week.
